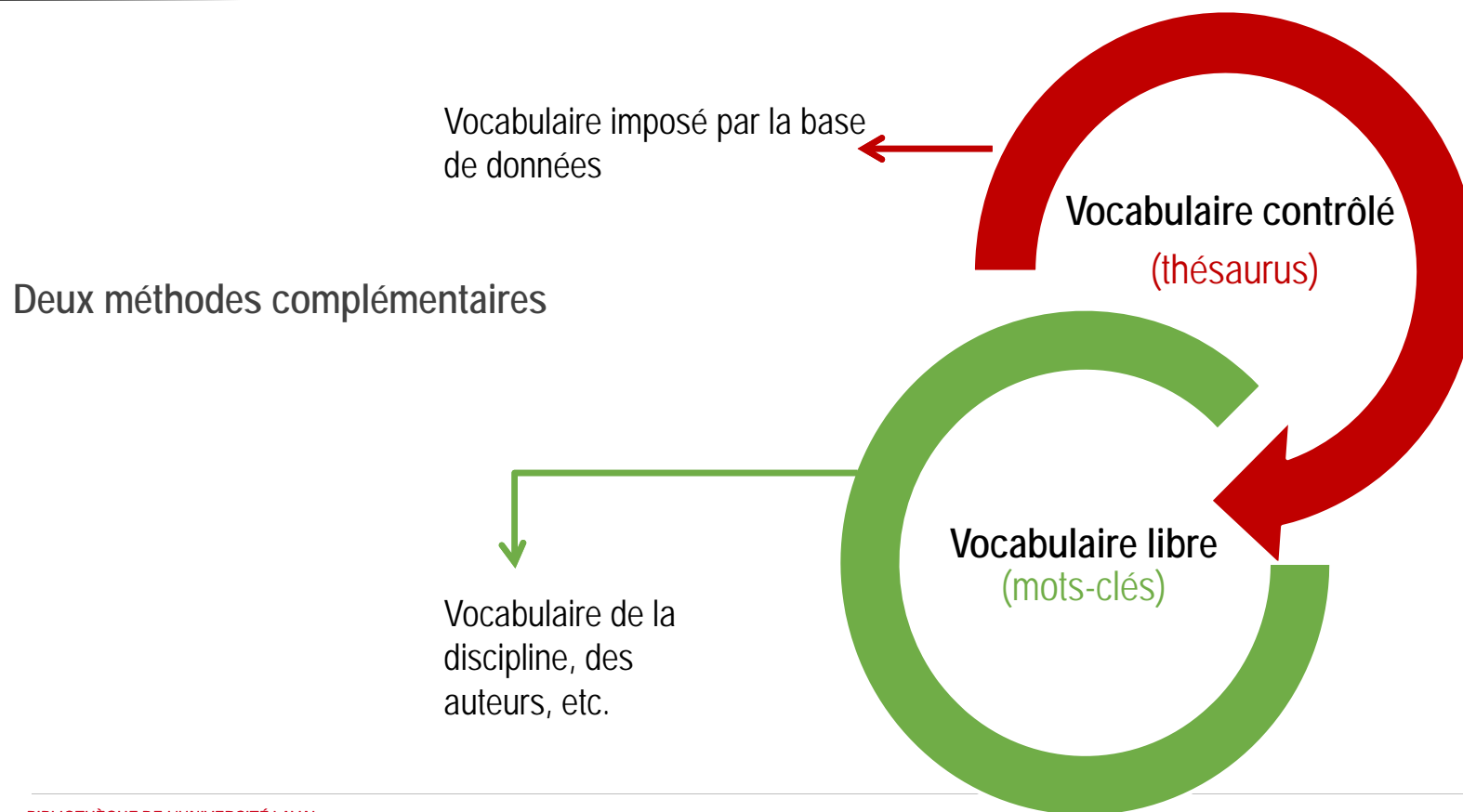

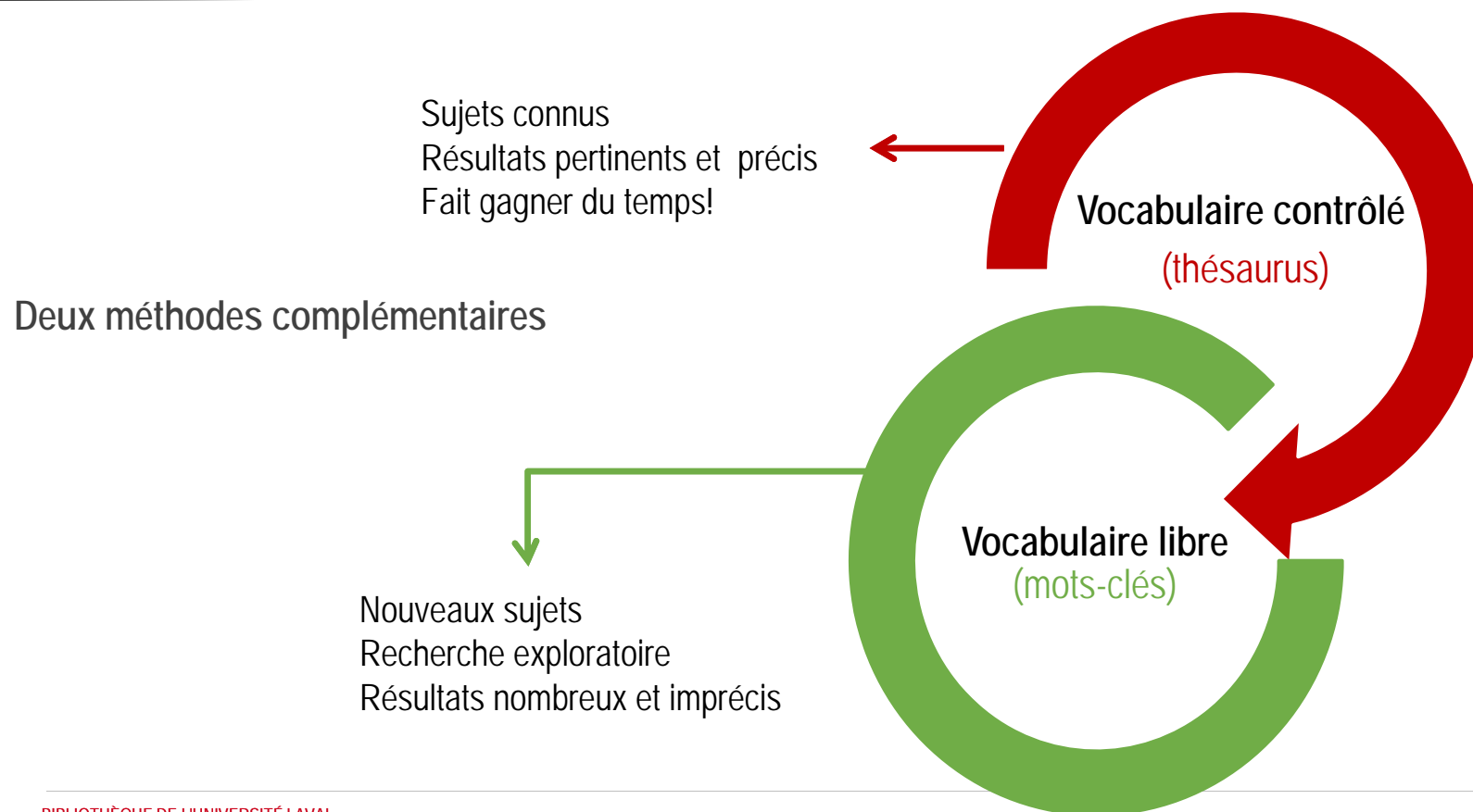

Résumé: Identifying the point at which individuals become at risk for academic failure (grade point average [GPA] < 2.0) involves an understanding of which and how many factors contribute to poor outcomes. School-related factors appear to be among the many factors that significantly impact academic success or failure. This study focused on 12 school-related factors. Using a thorough 5-step process, we identified which unique risk factors place one at risk for academic failure. Academic engagement, academic expectations, academic self-efficacy, homework completion, school relevance, school safety, teacher relationships (positive relationship), grade retention, school mobility, and school misbehaviors (negative relationship) were uniquely related to GPA even after controlling for all relevant covariates. Next, a receiver operating characteristic curve was used to determine a cutoff point for determining how many risk factors predict academic failure (GPA < 2.0). Results yielded a cutoff point of 2 risk factors for predicting academic failure, which provides a way for early identification of individuals who are at risk. 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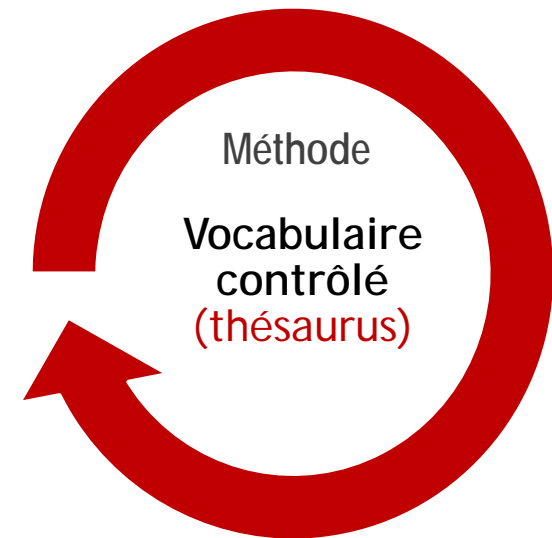

Interroger une base de données : vocabulaire contrôlé

- **Langage particulier** utilisé dans une base de données pour décrire le contenu des articles scientifiques qui y sont indexés
- **Une seule appellation** possible et **une seule orthographe** à utiliser
- **Validation des sujets** (descripteurs) dans une liste de vocabulaire appelée « thésaurus » avant de les utiliser pour la recherche
- Grâce au thésaurus, les articles sont **indexés uniformément**, peu importe le vocabulaire utilisé par l'auteur
- Plusieurs descripteurs sont attribués à chaque référence. Ils permettent de **décrire de la manière la plus spécifique possible** le contenu du document.
- Le champ ou (zone) de recherche **Sujet**



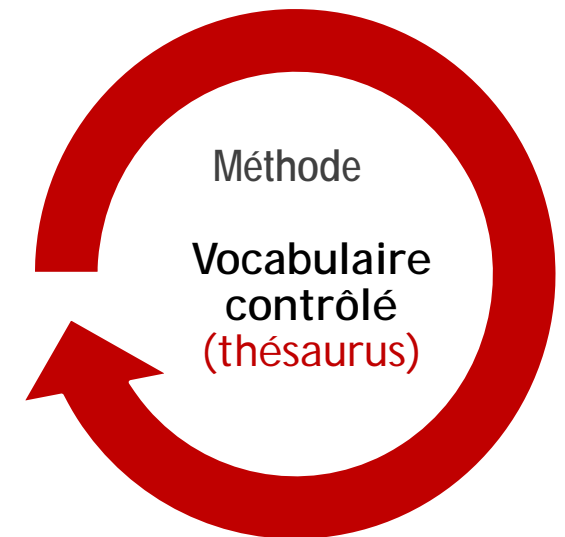
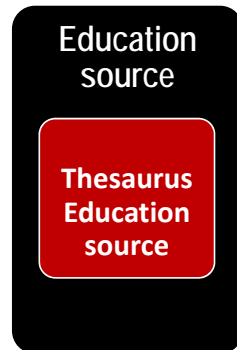
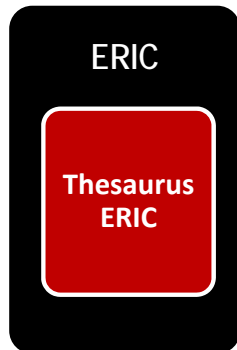

Le thésaurus

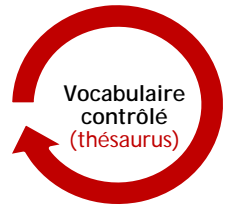
Liste structurée de concepts, termes normalisés classés et reliés entre eux, du terme le plus général au terme le plus spécifique.

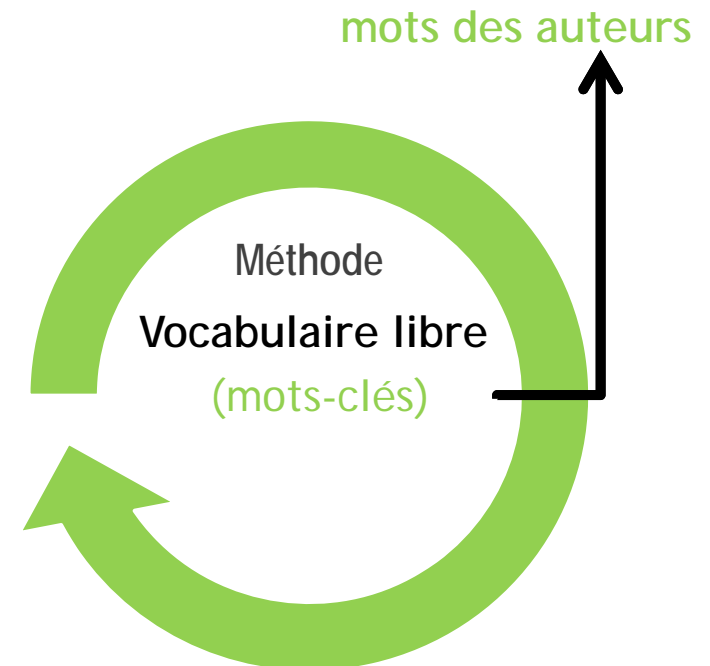

Interroger une base de données : vocabulaire libre

- Utiliser le **langage naturel**, les **termes des auteurs** ou ses **propres mots**, afin de repérer des documents sur le sujet d'intérêt
- Le choix et l'**orthographe** du mot ont une **incidence majeure** sur les résultats de recherche.
- Inscrire toutes les variantes orthographiques d'un mot-clé
- Trouver des **synonymes**, **termes équivalents**, **apparentés**, etc. pour chacun des mots-clés
- Privilégier les champs **Titre[TI]** et **Résumé [AB]**

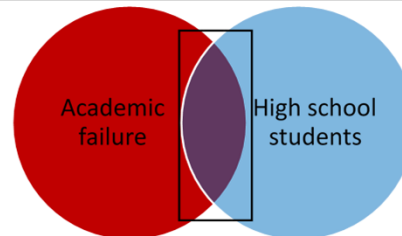
